Housing Needs

An update from Jacqui, on the Rural Housing Enabling Project



It has been a busy month with a lot to do and learn! Key elements this month have included the following:-

What are Housing Needs Surveys?

Before any sort of affordable housing can be considered, you have to establish a need. Anecdotal evidence is not enough, you need physical evidence to show planners, housing providers and funders as well as to inform the community that there is a genuine need for affordable housing in the area. Surveys appear to be the best way to collect this information and whilst anyone can design and implement the survey, Dorset Council already has the software that will not only collect the data but will analyse it, saving a lot of time. In the past, I and others, have trudged through lanes and farmyards, in all weathers, delivering paper surveys and then spent hours collecting, collating and analyising the information.

I am fortunate that Dorset Council is keen for communities to make use of this resource and it helps keep a consistent approach for comparison throughout the county and the Council can use the information collected at ground level, to influence future housing and planning strategy.

Paper copies are available too and in addition, the online version offers a link to the Housing Register applications for those that may be eligible. The Housing Register and how that works is something I am currently getting to grips with and is also key to evidencing the need for affordable housing in a lot more detail and together with the Housing Needs surveys give an overall view of the housing status in an area.

Please keep an eye out for these surveys as there may be one coming to your area, within the next 6 months.

These surveys are so important and relate to everyone currently living within the specified area as well as to anyone who has or had a local connection to the area, whether through residency, family or work. We can use this information to start taking action towards finding a way to fund a small-scale affordable housing scheme in the community and hopefully enable people to stay or come back to the villages, especially the displaced working population and their families who help to keep rural community services and businesses running.

Visiting Existing Affordable Homes

Dorset has some wonderful examples of existing Affordable Housing Schemes and I was lucky enough to visit some of them over the last month. I am able use these as examples of what is possible and perhaps to change perceptions regarding the look and quality of the properties being built. Of equal interest has been how the sites have come about, including discovering that on a number of occasions the land has been gifted to the community for the purpose of affordable housing or been offered at a (cont. overleaf)

significantly reduced cost. A lot of attention has been given to the design and layout of the properties and to their energy efficiency, many having air source heat pumps and solar panels installed. I spoke residents as well as neighbours to discover the impact of the development.Without exception, for the residents, the opportunity has been positively life changing for them, physically and mentally. Also for their children and extended families, with closer connections, increased practical and moral support.

Local businesses reported they were glad to have people working for them living in closer proximity and who were more likely to stay on. Neighbours reported an increase in vibrancy and community activity within the village, people looking out for each other, facilities and events being better supported. It reminded me why this role is so important and keeps me motivated, despite the challenges.

Top priority has been to engage with Parish Councils that have been identified as areas that would benefit from some affordable housing. This is based primarily on perceived housing need and taking into consideration in the activities and facilities available in the Parish, including whether or not there is a Neighbourhood Plan in place or in progress, a Community Land Trust already set up, if there is a school, shop, pub or other local businesses in the Parish or nearby etc..

There has been a slight delay in progress due to the local elections for Parish and County Councillors in May. Any decision making has gone on hold for a little while and then time is needed as new Councillors attend training and familiarise themselves with their new responsibilities. The General Election has similar implications on a national



level and again decisions relating to policy relevant to my role have gone on hold.

However, there has been plenty to get on with and much like the new Councillors, I have also been taking time to get to grips with current housing and planning legislation and policies.

Seed2Plate Updates from the Garden

The weather has improved but the slugs and snails have been out in force in all the plots enjoying our salads before we can get to them.

The courtyard garden at Wimborne is coming together nicely, with the scented



roses blooming, lettuce and greenery flourishing and scented herbs adding that Mediterranean feel.

We had a group of volunteers from Hays Recruitment join us at our Kingston Lacy plot, the transformation was amazing! They got the grass cut, tidied up the beds, planted French beans, runner beans, carrots and beetroot and sowed seeds for more salad and root veg.

Sessions at the community garden on Littlemoor have started with the beds being filled with tasty produce. Can you spare two hours a week to help us plant, grow, care for and harvest the produce to donate to the local foodbank?

The Centre, Ferndown is holding Seed2Plate sessions to get the local community involved in outdoor horticulture activities, exploring different land-based themes, learning about plants and how to maintain them, biodiversity and connecting them to Ferndown Common through horticulture.

We are looking for volunteers at our National Trust Kingston Lacy allotment plot in Wimborne, helping to grow produce to donate to the community lounge at our centre in Wimborne.

We will be recruiting learners to take part in our NOCN Level 1 Award in Horticulture programme specifically for those with mental health issues, disabilities and learning disabilities.

If reading this has sparked your interest in learning how to grow your own food or helping us care for our sites, then get in touch about our 12 session Seed2Plate course at our community courtyard kitchen garden at Wimborne Community Centre on Friday's 10.00am – 12.30pm. These FREE sessions will involve helping us to finish the redesign of the garden, planting it up and growing and harvesting food for the community lounge and fridge and will help set you up as Seed2Plate volunteer.

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Behind the Scenes:

At the Community Kitchen, A Hub of Generosity and Resourcefulness



In a quaint town nestled in Poole, there's a community kitchen that's more than just a place to cook—it's a hub of generosity and resourcefulness. I had the pleasure of sitting down with Jane, the coordinator of the kitchen, to learn more about where the food comes from and how they serve the community.

Where does the food come from for the community kitchen?

"Most of the food comes from Tesco," Jane explains. "We are able to go and collect our food on a Saturday evening at 9 o'clock from Tesco Express in Poole." She goes on to mention FareShare, a national company that organizes collections for food nearing its expiration date from supermarkets, helping to prevent food waste."

What sort of food do they have on a Saturday night at Tesco?

"We collect in batches," Jane describes. "Bakery and confectionery, chilled foods, and ambient foods like fruit and veg and chilled fruit from the fridges. It could be prepaid meals, eggs, cheese—anything like that or whatever is left and going out of date."

Where else do you get food for the community kitchen?

Jane lists a variety of sources: "We have a community fund from the Coop, receive donations from people who come into the center, and also have donations from people who have allotments and where there is a surplus, they give us donated food."

What do you do with the food that you can't actually cook the same day/next day? "The food that can't be cooked goes straight into our Community Fridge which is called Sybil," Jane explains. When asked about the name, she humorously shares, "I was doing



a tender to raise some income for the community lounge and kitchen, and I had to give the fridge a name. I came up with Sybil."

Tell me more about the Community Fridge.

"Community Fridges are there largely to help people with the cost of living," Jane elaborates. "If they can't afford as much food as they'd like, the food in the fridges is free. The other main reason for a community fridge is to prevent food waste." She goes on to describe how they share what they collect through social media posts, allowing people to come and collect food for free. Additionally, meals made from the collected food are placed in the fridge or served up on specific days, with extra meals frozen to supply the community throughout the week.

Jane concludes, "We may ask for donations from those who are able to afford to pay. This helps us to purchase items not covered by the food donations."

In this cozy corner of Poole, the community kitchen not only nourishes bodies but also fosters a sense of togetherness and support. From rescuing food from being wasted to providing meals for those in need, it's a testament to the power of community care and resourcefulness.

In essence, the Community Kitchen isn't just about food, it's a beacon of community support, resourcefulness and innovation. With Jayne at the helm and a dedicated team of volunteers, it continues to thrive, enriching the lives of those it serves.

Funder: Community Ownership fund

Who can apply: Incorporated groups working for their communities.
How much? Up to £2m in theory, but mostly up to £250,000.
Focusing on: Those that are at risk of loss without community intervention, can be run viably and sustainably in community hands for the long-term benefit of the community, or if already owned, the asset requires essential renovations to be sustainable for the long-term benefit of the community.

Notes: There is a two stage application process - stage one; expression of interest then, if successful, you can apply during a bidding window **Important dates:** Opening 12.07.24 Closing 31.03.25 - there will be four bidding windows.

Funder: Platinum Jubilee Village Hall Fund

Who can apply: Those working on a renovation or improvement project (not repair or maintenance), the work must be completed by March 2025.

How much? Grants up to £75,000, broken down as 20% of eligible project costs minimum £7,500 (project value £37,500), maximum £75,000 (project value £375,000).

Notes: There is a two stage application process - stage one; expression of interest then, if successful, you can apply. DCA can give help with the Stage 2 application for free.

Important dates: Closing in March 2025 - but applications should go in sooner rather than later.
